Two years ago I had a vision, born from my own experience of the power of interfaith learning and relationship-building. We would create a space where people from different faith backgrounds could come together to learn from one another, build community together, and promote a more just and loving world.

One year ago, the first four Abrahamic House residents moved into their new home in Los Angeles to create just that. One short week later, the state - and largely, the world - came to a standstill as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. A few short months later, protests against racism broke out across the country, including in LA.



Through this upheaval and uncertainty, Abrahamic House remained stalwart in its commitment to creating spaces for meaningful interfaith relationship-building, learning, and understanding to take place. Despite these difficult circumstances, our four inaugural fellows got to know each other on deep levels. They learned from and challenged each other, they built together, they held programs for a broadened community of participants from all over the country and world. LIVING TOGETHER, CARING FOR EACH OTHER

An important part of the Abrahamic House experience is the chance for residents to bond, share their respective holidays and religious practices, and ultimately become more effective allies for each other.

The fellows held **Religion 101** sessions for each other, sharing the major tenets of their respective religions. They observed each other's major **holidays**, having a chance to experience each other's practices as a group. They shared weekly meals, and had **important conversations** about the struggles each of their communities face. They also underwent **training** in anti-Semitism, Islamophobia, and anti-Black racism. In December they held an event about what they learned about **allyship** - find it [here](#).





The fellows planned innovative and meaningful monthly **programs** for a broad audience. These included film screenings, a new moon dance party, a symposium on the meaning of fasting for different religions, and more.

They also held “**nontraditional programs**” that took place off of Zoom. For example, they distributed care packages that included information about their religions as well as goodies like protein bars and hand sanitizer, and they blogged and shared videos about their experiences with each other’s holidays.
